Extract of a letter from H. R. H. the Duke of Cumberland to H.R.H. the Duke of Cambridge

Dated Berlin Nov: 29.'1833

"Our Chasse at Strelitz did not turn out as favorably as formerly, orving to George having given into these new dammed Doctrines and having ordered His Game to be shot - which to His great displeasure has been done much too much - I took the liberty of telling Him, that to diminish was one thing, extirpate another and which tho Sovereign, He was not authorized to do, as He must consider His Title to the Government only for His life and that he must remember He had a Son, who would be His Successor. Now I own this seems to Me, to be very little thought of now a days and therefore I abstain from coming to Hannover, much as I should like it, but, disapproving in toto of every that is doing, and which I never can or shall sanction, so I will not commit myself.
